### **Course Overview:**

As constant communicators, we are experts at code switching—altering the patterns, tones, and messages of our speech/writing depending on our audience and the context of the communication. Think of how you speak differently when you are around friends, professors, your parents, or strangers; every time you alter your speech to fit that conversation, you are code-switching.

As writers, we are also presented with many choices when it comes to our forms of communication. Choosing to write in different genres means you could present an argument in an academic paper, include images and infographs, or utilize various audio/visual media. Working with different academic and popular/media genres demand many skills of us: observation, inference, analysis, convention, rebellion, revision, and reflection.

The purpose of this special section of 1105 is two-fold: 1) We will be utilizing tablet PCs, and a software called ThoughtSwap in order to engage in discussion using technology; and 2) two of your major assignments will involve group work. As engineers, you will often be asked to work in teams. Collaborative writing is not always easy, but preparing you to write with others will be a key focus this semester and will help you develop your team skills. This requires cooperation, planning, and often, patience.

Individually in this class, you will be asked to **follow a topic** of your choice throughout the semester, the culmination of which will result in a **wiki page** by the end of the semester. Each week you will be following online forums, wikis, blogs, and websites in order to get the latest news on your topic. As you would with any long-term project, a brief 300-word report will be due every Friday. This can include additions, edits, or corrections.

Secondly, you will be asked to **read critically and rhetorically** in preparation for **three major assignments**: a visual analysis, a music project, and technical instructions for creative digital media software (Photoshop, iMovie, etc).

Lastly, this course will focus heavily on helping you get to know yourself as a writer. To help you keep focus on **your own writing process** this throughout the semester, you will be completing **writing journal entries** in your wiki. These will often be in response to the major assignments, but the journal is also yours to use as you see fit. I will log in to Scholar and check it periodically.

These assignments, along with the wiki page, are designed to prepare you for writing and communicating in many environments, and will help us to achieve the following outcomes:

- Gain knowledge of composition’s rhetorical dimensions
- Use writing as a tool for critical thinking and reflection
- Practice writing as a process via using multiple brainstorming, invention, revision, and editing strategies
- Write in several genres that utilize analysis, reflection, narrative, critique, and argument skill
- Practice using the conventions of written, spoken, and visual composition
- Practice writing and creating in digital environments
